






SECTION D

²⁹ Read the following paragraph and answer the questions that follow.

A semiconductor diode is basically a p-n junction with metallic contacts provided at the ends for the application of an external voltage. It is a two terminal device. When an external voltage is applied across a semiconductor diode such that p-side is connected to the positive terminal of the battery and n-side to the negative terminal, it is said to be forward biased. When an external voltage is applied across the diode such that n-side is positive and p-side is negative, it is said to be reverse biased. An ideal diode is one whose resistance in forward biasing is zero and the resistance is infinite in reverse biasing. When the diode is forward biased, it is found that beyond forward voltage called knee voltage, the conductivity is very high. When the biasing voltage is more than the knee voltage the potential barrier is overcome and the current increases rapidly with increase in forward voltage. When the diode is reverse biased, the reverse bias voltage produces a very small current about a few microamperes which almost remains constant with 4 bias. This small current is reverse saturation current.

³¹ (a) Obtain the formula for the electric field due to a long thin wire of uniform linear charge density " λ " using Gauss's law.

(b) Three charges($-\sqrt{2\mu}C$), ($2\sqrt{2\mu}C$) and ($-\sqrt{2\mu}C$) are arranged along a straight line as shown in the figure. Calculate the total electric field due to all three charges at the point P.

(a) A series LCR circuit is connected to an ac source of variable frequency. Draw a suitable phasor diagram to deduce the expressions for the amplitude of the current and phase angle.

(b) Obtain the condition of resonance. Draw a plot showing the variation of current with the frequency of a.c. source for two resistances R_1 and R_2 ($R_1 > R_2$).

(a) Draw a ray diagram for the formation of image of a point object by a thin double convex lens having radii of curvature R₁ and R₂. Hence derive lens maker's formula.

(b) A converging lens has a focal length of 10 cm in air. It is made of a material of refractive index 1.6. If it is immersed in a liquid of refractive index 1.3, find its new focal length.
